## **ESSAY**

1. It is important that early childhood teachers understand the deleterious effects of poverty on young children and families. Explain three reasons that early childhood teachers might be concerned. Also, explain some of the documented effects of poverty on young children.

## ANS:

Reasons for concern:

• Number of young children living in poverty is increasing.

Families do not reap enough redistribution of income from government.

• Current political view about role of government does not allow for meaningful ways to assist poor families.

Effects of poverty on children:

- high-risk status
- difficult peer relationships
- school problems
- low self-esteem
- neighborhood violence
- prejudice against poor families

2. Recommendations for practices that foster an inclusive environment so that all families can participate in their children's education have been offered by Boethel. List and discuss at least five of these practices.

## ANS:

- All family involvement policies must focus on all areas of diversity.
- The school principal plays a critical role in meaningful family involvement.
- Actively support and respect that all families have high aspirations for their children.
- Both similarities and differences must be acknowledged.
- Teacher preparation and professional development must include in-depth content in the area of working with families.
- Schools must help immigrant families understand the system.
- Go an extra mile to support families in their involvement in children's education.
- Trust is crucial, but it takes time to develop.

3. Define and explain differences among the terms: ethnicity, race and culture. How is it helpful for teachers to understand these terms?

#### ANS:

- Ethnicity: concept of a group's "peoplehood" that includes race, religion, cultural history, part of one's psychological identity
- Race: physical differences in people that include skin tone and facial structure; Mongoloid, Negroid, Caucasoid
- Culture: an ethnic group's unique experiences and history. It is learned, characteristic of groups, rules for behavior, cultures share rules, individuals embedded to differing degrees and often are not able to describe the rules

4. Illustrate and explain the iceberg model for understanding culture. Provide an anecdote related to this model from your lived experiences.

#### ANS:

- Iceberg drawing with labels for concrete, behavioral and symbolic levels of understanding culture
- Concrete: most visible to those outside the culture
- Behavioral: language, social roles, cultural values
- Symbolic: difficult for those outside culture to detect and implicit in practices and values of those within the culture
