- 14. Have the students apply the strategies in this chapter to their own essays. Then, have them exchange papers with their writing group, and encourage them to apply the same guidelines to the peer essay.
- 15. Write your own essay, responding to the same prompt that your students do. Make copies of the essay, omitting your name, and throw them into the "mix" of peer revising and editing groups.

- Describe the process you go through when you write. What do you do first? Last? Do you have anything special with you when you write? Why?
- Think about how the reader would react to an essay that is completely out of order (conclusion first, title at the end of the essay, etc.). What would the essay look and sound like? Do you think the reader would enjoy reading such an essay? Now write an essay that is all jumbled up, and see if a classmate can find its different parts.
- Record your thoughts and observations about your work in this chapter. What did you learn from working with a student essay? How do you view your own writing as a result?
