Ans: Varies. Micro: how is child poverty the result of socialization? (this question is appropriate because to answer this question, one would look at smaller scale interactions and might require talking to people). Meso: how do non-profit organizations help to alleviate child poverty? (this question is appropriate because to answer this question, the researcher would look at institutions and organizations). Macro: has child poverty increased in the past two decades? (this question is appropriate because the researcher would look at global patterns and trends).

Anthropologists might ask what homelessness means to the homeless person. An economist might look at the patterns of the job market that lead to homelessness. A psychologist might investigate to see if homelessness and mental

health problems are correlated. A sociologist could potentially be interested in all of the above. However, unique to sociology, they would be sure to include questions about how homelessness is produced by social institutions and social processes.
