## Chapter 1 - Light and Life

ANSWER: Nature provides a great range of light environments, ranging from the total darkness of caves and the deep ocean to the stark brightness of deserts and polar regions. Differences in the intensity and spectral composition of the light environment in influence how a population may adapt to a specific habitat and, in so doing, contribute to the huge diversity of organisms we find on Earth. Animals use colour to communicate, attract the mate, feed better and raise more offspring. Plants use colour to attract pollinators.
