ANSWER: Empowerment research examines social settings and conditions in order to identify key issues and it involves stakeholders for the purpose of improvement. It is undertaken to improve the social circumstances of a marginalized group or community.

108. What is evaluation research? Give an example of how this methodology might be used.

ANSWER: Evaluation research is used to assess the effectiveness of a social program. Prior to the actual assessment, a needs assessment may be undertaken to determine the nature of the problem and the resources available. The program evaluation should help us understand if the program worked and if the objectives of the program were achieved.

109. Define the qualitative research method and give an example.

ANSWER: The qualitative research method is most often employed to better understand social phenomena using inductive reasoning and non-numerical data. Examples include systematic observation, participant observation, focus groups, and unstructured interviews.

Empowerment research is intended to improve the conditions of a group, not just to collect information. Researchers work closely with all stakeholders who have an interest in the outcome of the research. The research is intended to solve a problem and a plan to this end is developed. Community members are not the subjects of the research but co-participants. Participatory action research is a major form of empowerment research.

117. Describe the key steps for conducting sociological research using the relationship between gender and suicide as an example.

ANSWER:

118. Describe the design of an experiment intended to investigate what effect reading negative information about the Internet has on people's attitudes toward Internet usage.

ANSWER.

The experiment would need to randomly assign subjects to control and experimental group. The former will not be exposed to the negative information while the latter will not be. Negative information is the independent variable and attitude toward the Internet is the dependent variables. Attitude would be measured before the experimental group was exposed to the information and afterward as well. The before-and-after comparison of the experimental group will tell us if the information had any effect.

119. Identify the Tri-Council Statement on Research Ethics and briefly describe its major components.

ANSWER:

This is the policy adopted by the three major research funding agencies in Canada. It is intended to ensure that human subjects involved in research are protected from unethical treatment. The major components include respect for persons, concern for welfare, justice.

120. Describe the two main methods for collecting survey data, noting any strengths and weaknesses.

121. Describe some of the difficulties that social scientists face when doing survey research.

122. According to the text, secondary data analysis is considered an effective method of collecting social science data. Discuss and describe the nature of secondary data as an aspect of scientific research in sociology. Include examples to illustrate your understanding of this data-gathering methodology.

The responses should also include reference to content analysis, discourse analysis, historical analysis, and the strengths and limitations of secondary analyses.
