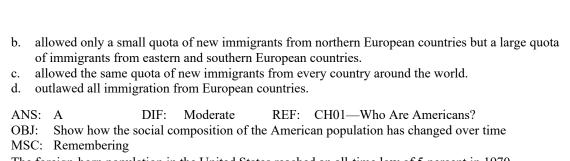

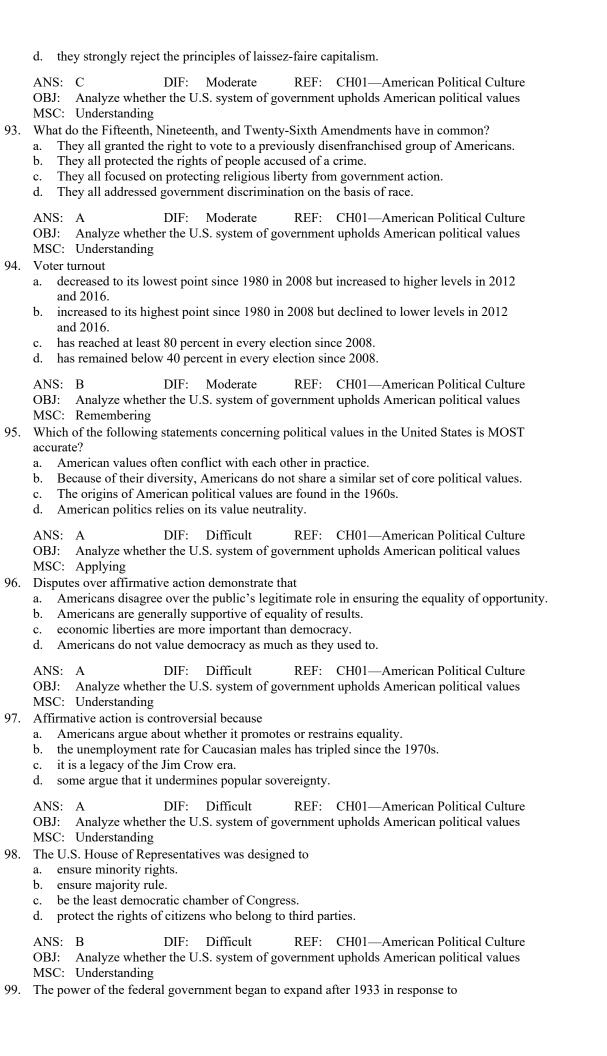

ESSAY

1. What does it mean to be a citizen and how has our ideal of citizenship been influenced by the ancient Greeks? Do most Americans seem to live up to this ideal of citizenship? In your answer, be sure to discuss how political knowledge is important and whether most Americans have the requisite amount of political knowledge to live up to our ideals.

ANS:

There are three components to this question:

- Defining citizenship: Citizenship means informed and active membership in a political community. As understood by the ancient Greeks, citizenship goes beyond voting. A good citizen must be politically engaged and have the knowledge needed to participate in political debate. Put differently, in the contemporary United States and in ancient Greece, citizenship means enlightened political engagement.
- Importance of political knowledge: Citizens need political knowledge in order to identify and assess their political interests. They also need knowledge in order to know when and how to act on their interests. Finally, citizens need political knowledge to ascertain what they cannot or should not ask of government.
- Americans' level of political knowledge: The state of political knowledge in the United States today is spotty. Most Americans know little about current issues or debates or even the basics of how government works. Most Americans know little about current issues or debates. Numerous surveys indicate that the majority of Americans have significant gaps in their political knowledge. In other words, most Americans do not live up to the ideal of citizenship discussed earlier.

There are many types of governments in the world today. What characteristics do political scientists use to distinguish between different types of government? What are the defining characteristics of an autocracy, an oligarchy, and a democracy? What are the defining characteristics of a constitutional government, an authoritarian government, and a totalitarian government? ANS:

There are three components to this question:

- Distinguishing between types of governments: Two questions are of special importance in determining how governments differ: Who governs? And how much government control is permitted?
- Defining autocracy, oligarchy, and democracy: These forms of government relate to who governs. Autocracy is a form of government in which a single individual rules. An oligarchy is a form of government in which a small group controls most of the governing decisions. A democracy is a system of rule that permits citizens to play a significant part in the governmental process, usually through the election of key public officials.
- Defining constitutional, authoritarian, and totalitarian government: These forms of government relate to how much control is permitted. A constitutional government is a system of rule in which formal and effective limits are placed on the powers of the government. An authoritarian government is a system of rule in which the government recognizes no formal limits but may nevertheless be restrained by the power of other social institutions. A totalitarian government is a system of rule in which the government recognizes no formal limits on its power and seeks to absorb or eliminate other social institutions that might challenge it.

What are some of the different meanings of equality, and how have these different meanings produced conflict over the public's role in addressing inequality? In your answer, be sure to discuss at least two specific controversies involving government action and equality.

ANS:

There are two components to this question:

- Different meanings of equality: Few Americans embrace the ideal of full equality of results, but most share the ideal of equality of opportunity—that is, the notion that each person should be given a fair chance to go as far as his or her talents will allow. Americans make clear distinctions between political equality and social or economic equality. Political equality means that members of the American political community have the right to participate in politics on equal terms (that is, "one person, one vote"). Americans have always been less concerned about social or economic inequality and less supportive of government efforts to redress these kinds of inequalities.
- Controversies over equality: Americans have engaged in three kinds of controversies about the public role in addressing inequality. The first is determining what constitutes equality of access to public institutions (for example, Plessy v. Ferguson and Brown v. Board of Education). A second debate concerns the public role in ensuring equality of opportunity in private life (for example, affirmative action). A third debate about equality concerns differences in income and wealth (for example, discussions of tax policy and income inequality).

ANS:

There are three components to this question:

- a. What Americans mean by liberty: For Americans, liberty means personal freedom and economic freedom. Both are linked to
 the idea of limited government, and the word *liberty* has come to mean many of the freedoms guaranteed in the Bill of Rights
 —freedom of speech, the right to assemble, and the right to practice religious beliefs without interference from the
 government.
- b. How liberty has changed over time: The central historical conflict regarding liberty in the United States was about the enslavement of blacks. Over the course of American history, the scope of personal liberties has expanded. Far fewer restrictions exist today on the press, political speech, and individual moral behavior than in the early years of the nation.
- c. Health care reform: As of 2016, the Affordable Care Act requires businesses with more than 50 employees to provide health coverage for their employees and that insurers pay for access to contraceptive care. Many businesses opposed the law's requirements as a violation of their fundamental liberties to run their businesses as they see fit. In 2014, the Supreme Court ruled that family firms could be exempted from the contraceptive requirement on the basis of religious objections.

Is there any reason to be worried about how much trust citizens have in their government?

ANS:

There are three components to this question:

- a. Levels of political trust: The public's trust in government has declined dramatically over the last 50 years, from three-quarters of Americans saying they trust government in the 1960s to 18 percent of Americans expressing this view in 2017. Trust in government did increase momentarily, however, after the September 11, 2001, attacks.
- b. Abstract conservatives and operational liberals: When asked questions about the role of government in general, the majority of Americans give answers on the conservative side of the political spectrum. At the same time, however, when asked about specific government programs, majorities offer strong support. In other words, many Americans prefer small government in the abstract but very much like what government does in some specific issue areas.
- c. Reasons to be worried about trust in government: Low levels of trust can have negative consequences for the country, such as the public refusing to pay adequate taxes, the government having difficulty in attracting talented and effective workers to public service, and the country being unable to defend its economic and national security interests.
