Using World of Essential College Vocabulary Book 2

Knowledge of word meanings is an important and robust predictor of academic success at the college level. However, developmental students often lack wide and rich vocabularies, as well as strategies for acquiring words independently. This book and companion Book 1 help students prepare for college academic work by teaching important words and vocabulary learning strategies. The predictable lesson format and instructional supports facilitate independent student use. However, we recommend that instructors introduce each lesson, at least briefly. The book is easily used as either a supplementary or a core text.

This book teaches 240 words, as well as common derivatives. The twelve lessons are grouped into four sections, each focusing on strategies: (1) dictionary and dictionary websites – lessons 1-3, (2) context clues – lessons 4-6, (3) prefixes – lessons 7-9, (4) roots and suffixes – lessons 10-12. Each lesson is divided into two parts, which may be taught separately. Each lesson (except for the first) has an instructional theme. Examples are "unusual derivatives" (lesson 3) and "co-and dis-" (lesson 8). In several lessons, the theme is used only in the first part, avoiding student confusion that can result when too many words are similar. Lesson sections that are not themed teach valuable words that help prepare students for rigorous academic work.

Words were chosen based upon general adult usage, as reflected in word frequency corpora, lists of words important to college success, words suitable for teaching word elements, and pilot studies. Before the books were published, they were used extensively in developmental classes.

Additional resources for instructors can be found on an instructor website at **login.cengage.com** These include Powerpoint slides to aid the instructor in introducing each lesson, additional teaching tips, and further background on the book. Answers to book exercises, a complete testing program, and answers to tests are found both in this printed manual and on the website. Tests have been constructed for each lesson and for each half lesson (**Half-lesson quizzes repeat the lesson quiz items** for each section, for each half of the book, and for the entire book (a final)).
